INTRODUCTION TO SAN ANTONIO!

San Antonio's character is a colorful blend of Mexican and Texan culture. It is 150 miles (240 km) from the Mexican border at Laredo, on one of the most-traveled routes to Mexico. Much of its population (about three-fifths) is of Hispanic (mainly Mexican) descent, and many are Spanish-speaking or bilingual. It preserves much of its historical atmosphere and embraces its cultural diversity. Remains of 18th-century Spanish structures dot the city, contrasting with modern office buildings.

San Antonio's roots were largely military, and the city continues to have a large military presence. Today, San Antonio is officially known as "Military City, USA" with one of the nation's largest active and retired military populations.

Military installations largely account for San Antonio's rapid growth after 1940. Today, Joint Base San Antonio is comprised of four major military installations: Lackland AFB, Randolph AFB, Fort Sam Houston AFB, and Camp Bullis.

Lackland, in the southwestern part of the city, is a training base for recruits. Randolph, in a suburban area to the northeast, is headquarters of the Air Education and Training Command. Fort Sam Houston (1879), inside the city, is the headquarters of the U.S. Fifth Army and is the site of a national cemetery and the Academy of Health Sciences, the Army's basic school for medical personnel. There are about 85,000 military personnel in San Antonio and veterans make up 65 percent of the population.

San Antonio boasts 35 medical facilities and the Veteran's Healthcare in this area is anchored by the South Texas Veterans Health Care System hospitals and clinics. The South Texas Veterans Health Care System (STVHCS) is comprised of the Audie L. Murphy Memorial VA Hospital, the Kerrville VA Hospital and the Satellite Clinic Division. The STVHCS is a 268-bed facility providing primary, secondary, and tertiary health care in medicine, surgery, psychiatry, and rehabilitation medicine. It also supports a 90-bed Community Living Center, a 30-bed Spinal Cord Injury Center, an eight-bed Bone Marrow Transplant Unit, and a Geriatric Research, Education, and Clinical Center. Affiliated with the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, the system has an active ambulatory care program with satellite outpatient clinics in San Antonio and in Victoria.



Community-Based Clinics are located in Alice, Beeville, Brownsville, Eagle Pass, Kingsville, New Braunfels, San Marcos, Seguin, and Uvalde. The special needs of the Vietnam-era Veterans are met with Veteran Outreach Centers located in San Antonio. The system dedicates 28,000 square feet to medical research. There are more than 150 research investigators conducting over 500 research activities in areas such as aging, renal disease, diabetes, HIV/AIDs, and cancer treatment and therapy. The system has an NIH-funded General Clinical Research Center, the Veterans Evidence-Based Research Dissemination Implementation Center (VERDICT), and is a Cochrane Centre site.

MILITARY DEPENDENTS

The term "military families" often refers to the spouses, children, and adult dependents of active duty, National Guard, and Reserve Component service members. According to the most recent U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) Demographics Report, there are ~2.6 million military family members and almost 39% of military personnel have minor children (under 20 or 22 and full-time student).

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF VETERAN AFFAIRS

The VA was formally established in 1930 and became the cabinet-level Department of Veterans Affairs in 1989. The agency is led by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The VA website gives veterans access and a way to manage their benefits and healthcare. c. Veteran's Property Tax Exemption

• Provides that homeowners who meet Social Security disability guidelines can receive a \$10,000 property value exemption from school taxes.



- Provides this property value exemption is effective on January 1 of the tax year regardless of the date the person qualifies and will not increase unless the homeowner makes improvements.
- Provides a reduction of school tax ceilings on residence homesteads for people who are elderly or have disabilities.
- Allows cities, counties or junior college districts or their voters to adopt a tax limitation for homeowners with disabilities who meet Social Security disability guidelines.
- Provides that homeowners who meet Social Security disability guidelines may postpone paying current or delinquent taxes for as long as they own and live in the property (requires filing of affidavit). Once the property is no longer owned by the person with a disability, the taxes and interest are due immediately. Penalties on late taxes are reduced to 6%.
- Provides that veterans with disabilities may qualify for property tax exemption (home or other property) ranging from \$5,000 to \$12,000 depending on the severity of the disability.
